

**1. Course Description**

This course is for beginning students of the Japanese language. It is designed to help them achieve a level that goes beyond rote memorized proficiency to the beginning of elementary proficiency. Therefore, at the end of the course, students are able to recognize and write all the syllabic characters (hiragana and katakana) and some kanji characters (at least 40 characters), read some or all isolated words and phrases, and speak simple sentences needed for daily conversation using the polite grammatical form. In addition, it introduces topics on Japanese society and culture in order to form the foundation of cultural literacy.

**2. Student Learning Outcomes**

Students are expected to be able to do the following:

**Communication**

- 1) Engage in conversation, provide and obtain information, express feelings and emotions, and exchange thoughts, ideas, and opinions orally in the Japanese language at the Novice level as described by the Japan Foundation Standard or <http://www.jpf.go.jp/e/japanese/report/24.html> (see #3 Can-Do Goals for the details)
  - a. Conduct conversations and transactions in short, simple terms, using a very basic range of simple expressions about personal details and needs of a concrete type.
  - b. Listen to very simple statements if the speech is aimed directly at oneself and is slow and clear, and possibly respond to them in verbal form.
- 2) Interpret and communicate thoughts, ideas, and opinions, provide and obtain information, express feelings and emotions in writing in the Japanese language at the Novice level as described by the Japan Foundation Standard or <http://www.jpf.go.jp/e/japanese/report/24.html> (see #3 Can-Do Goals for the details)
  - a. Read and understand short and simple texts and fixed phrases
  - b. Write in short, simple sentences, such as where one went, what one did, etc.

**Culture**

- 1) Recognize distinctive artifacts and practices of Japanese culture
- 2) Demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the artifacts and practices as well as the perspectives (attitudes, values, and beliefs) of Japanese culture.

**Connection**

- 1) Acquire information and recognize the distinctive viewpoints that are only available through Japanese language and its culture.

**Comparison**

- 1) Demonstrate a minimum level of understanding of the nature of language through comparisons of the languages studied and their own.
- 2) Demonstrate a minimum level of understanding of the concept of culture through comparisons of the cultures studied and their own.

**Community**

- 1) Use the language both within and beyond the school setting.
- 2) Show evidence of becoming life-long learners by using the language for personal and community growth, enjoyment, and enrichment.
